The distributive property of multiplication over addition states: $a(b+c)=a \cdot b+a \cdot c$ or $a(b+c)=a b+a c$.
The same is true for subtraction:
$a(b-c)=a \cdot b-a \cdot c$ or $a(b-c)=a b-a c$.

1. $-3(-2 x+5)=(-3) \cdot-2 x+(-3) \cdot 5$ Distribute 3 through the parentheses; Multiply -3 by $-2 x \&$ multiply -3 by 5 .

| Definition | Illustration on <br> $2 x+5 x-3 y+1$ |
| :--- | :---: |
| Terms are separated by addition or subtraction. | $2 x, 5 x, 3 y$, and 1 are terms. |
| A coefficient is the number multiplied by a variable in a term. | 2,5 , and 3 are coefficients. |
| Like terms have exactly the same variable. | $2 x$ and $5 x$ are like terms. |
| A constant is a numerical term that does not have a variable. |  |
| Like terms can be combined by adding or subtracting their coefficients. |  |

- A variable is a symbol, usually a letter, used to represent a number.
- Algebraic expressions are combinations of variables, numbers, and at least one operation.
- Multiplication in algebra can be shown as $8 n$ or $8 \times n$
- The variables in an algebraic expression can be replaced with any number.
- Once the variables have been replaced, you can evaluate, or find the value of, the algebraic expression.
